- 3) You will submit a double spaced copy of your speech for evaluation.

Checklist

\square State the quote in its entirety, name its author and date it was written.
$\hfill\square$ Explain the meaning of the quote from the author's perspective.
□ Provide biographical information on the author of the quote. Who was the person? What are some of the experiences of the quote's author that makes the quote important? Under what circumstances did the author write the quote? Why did the person write the quote?
\Box How has the quote motivated and or influenced other people? Has the quote brought about any changes?
☐ What does the quote mean to you? Explain its impact on you. Has it provided you with insight? Has it offered you perspective? Recount a moment where this quote has inspired you.
